# **TURBT**

# Transurethral Resection of Bladder Tumor

#### What is a TURBT?

- A tumour that has been scraped away using an instrument that's passed through the urethra (the urine passage).
- This will heal over, initially with a scab and eventually, in most cases, regrow with normal lining tissue. The tissue removed at the time of surgery will be carefully examined and a detailed report will be available to your urologist and reviewed with you at your follow up appointment.

### **Post-Operative Instructions:**

The following instructions are provided to assist you with planning your self care and recovery after your operation.

- 1. You must have a responsible adult accompany you home and stay with you overnight.
- 2. You are advised that you should not operate a motor vehicle, machinery, or perform any tasks requiring skill, co-ordination or judgment, or make any legal decisions within 24 hours after your operation.
- 3. Take all of your regular medications as you took them before your operation, unless instructed otherwise.

### **Smoking:**

4. There is a strong association between smoking and bladder cancer. If you are a smoker, you must make every effort to stop smoking now.

#### Hygiene:

5. You may shower or bathe as you like.

#### **Bowel Function:**

6. Normal bowel function should return when you resume your normal diet and activity. Avoid straining to have a bowel movement. A stool softener from your local pharmacy may be added if needed.

#### **Activity:**

- 7. Gradually resume your usual activities over the next few days. Avoid heavy lifting (over 20 lbs) or straining for about 2 weeks as these can promote bleeding.
- 8. Travel or strenuous activity should be avoided until the urine is clear of blood for at least a week.
- 9. Sexual activity can be resume in about 2 weeks when you are comfortable.

#### **Medications:**

- 10. Take all of your regular medications as you took them before your operation, unless instructed otherwise.
- 11. Blood thinners may increase the risk of bleeding after your surgery so ask your doctor when you can resume these types of drugs.
- 12. You generally will not require any strong painkiller after you are discharged from hospital. Tylenol may be used if needed for any mild discomforts.



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#### **Voiding Function:**

- 13. It is not unusual to have increased frequency or urgency of urination for a few weeks after your surgery.
- 14. There may also be some burning with urination. These symptoms will resolve more promptly if you drink plenty of fluids and empty your bladder regularly.
- 15. Your voiding pattern should return to normal within a few weeks. There may be a bit of visible blood in the urine for a few weeks, you may even have a few blood clots, particularly after about 2 to 3 weeks post-surgery, when the scab comes away.
- 16. Delayed bleeding can be seen (uncommonly) for up to 6 weeks postoperatively. Severe burning with urination or fever may indicate a bladder infection. Contact Surgeon's office if these symptoms persist.

Contact your Doctor or seek medical attention if any of the following occurs:

- Signs of infection, including fever and chills
- Redness, swelling, increasing pain, excessive bleeding, or discharge at the incision site.
- Cough, shortness of breath, chest pain
- Pain that you cannot control with the medication that you have been given.
- Nausea and/or vomiting that you cannot control or which persist for more than two days after your surgery.
- Pain and/or swelling in your feet, calves or legs.

Contact your Doctor's office if you develop:

- High fever, suggestive of infection
- Heavy thick bleeding with clots
